WHAT ARE THE RULES?

Rowing is allowed everywhere in the harbour with the exception of the commercial port, but you need to use a special route to get between the main channel and Nordhavn in order to avoid sharing waters with the DFDS ferry, cruise ships, container ships and other large commercial ships. In the middle of the fairway there are harbour buses, canal cruise boats and large vessels.

- Wearing a lifejacket: You should always have a lifejacket with you, when on the water.
 From 1 October to 1 May, you must wear a lifejacket
- Keep to the right in the harbour just like on the roads
- Stay as close to the quayside as possible, and only cross the harbour channel perpendicularly to the fairway
- Remember to use a light when it gets dark.

 Just like on a bicycle
- Special rules govern Lynetteholm's working sites in the northern part of the harbour east of Trekroner. Yellow buoys with crosses indicate Lynetteholm's working sites at sea. 

TIPS FOR YOUR TRIP

- Bring a partner. There is always safety in numbers
- Be particularly aware of the traffic in the harbour and constantly keep a lookout
- Wear reflectors. The light from the city also reaches the harbour, so wear reflectors and be visible
- Assess the weather: Are your skills and equipment up to the wind and weather conditions? Check the weather forecast before going
- Plan a route at home. There is a lot of traffic and often waves in the Inner Harbour in the summer. Consider heading for other parts of the harbour.
