### WHAT ARE THE RULES?

Standup paddleboarding is permitted in the entire harbour with the exception of the commercial port, and a special route must be used to get between the main channel and Nordhavn. You thereby avoid sharing waters with the DFDS ferry, cruise ships, container ships and other large commercial vessels. In the middle of the fairway there are harbour buses, canal cruise boats and large vessels.

- Always wear a life jacket or swim vest on the water
- Keep to the right in the harbour just like on the roads
- Stay close to the quayside and only cross the harbour channel perpendicularly to the fairway
- Remember to use a light when it gets dark.

  Just like on a bicycle
- Special rules govern Lynetteholm's working sites in the northern part of the harbour east of Trekroner. Yellow buoys with crosses indicate Lynetteholm's working sites at sea. # TIPS FOR YOUR TRIP

- Always use a leash on your board
- Take a partner with you. There is always safety in numbers.
- Be particularly aware of the traffic in the harbour and constantly keep a lookout
- Wear reflectors. The light from the city also reaches the harbour, so wear reflectors and be visible
- Assess the weather: Are your skills and equipment up to the wind and weather conditions? Check the weather forecast before going
- Plan your route at home. There is a lot of traffic and often waves in the Inner Harbour in the summer. Consider heading for other parts of the harbour.
